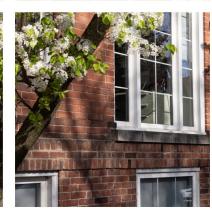
Land Acknowledgement

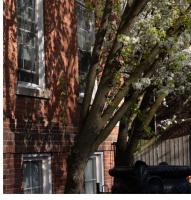

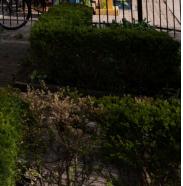




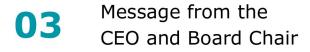

Message from the CEO and Board Chair

We are proud to share the Child Development Institute's (CDI) 2024-25 Annual Report: Pathways to Brighter Futures.

Every individual who enters through CDI's doors brings a unique mix of strengths, challenges, and lived experiences.

Through a holistic range of services — from early learning and mental health counselling to gender-based violence supports and therapeutic recreation — our teams build personalized pathways that honour diversity and promote resilience, healing, and long-term well-being.

The past year has brought both urgency and opportunity to the children's mental health and early learning sectors. One in five children and youth in Ontario continue to experience mental health challenges, yet more than 80% go untreated due to long wait times, underfunded services, and systemic barriers — with marginalized communities being disproportionately affected. Families face growing difficulty accessing high-quality childcare, while rates of gender-based violence have risen to crisis levels. These pressures have strained families, schools, and service providers and they have also accelerated the need for innovation.

Across Ontario, there is a growing shift towards evidence-based, early-intervention, and community-driven supports — a direction CDI has long championed. Every day, we see how personalized, wraparound services can change the trajectory of a young person's life, and we remain active in advocating for policies and systems that advance this important work.

This year marked the first year of our five-year strategic plan, Innovating for Impact. With an ambitious goal to improve outcomes for 50,000 children and youth by 2029, we are proud to be on track and seeing measurable progress

 having served 80% more children, youth and caregivers than the previous year across direct services and our growing affiliate network.

This work is guided by providing inclusive, culturally responsive, and evidence-informed care for our clients; driving systemic change through strategic partnerships and sector leadership; creating a culture of equity, inclusion, and continuous learning for our staff; and, investing in infrastructure to ensure our growth is both sustainable and resilient. Across each of these areas, CDI is laying the groundwork to reach more children, strengthen more families, and shape a future where all young people have equitable opportunities to thrive.

Our ability to do this work is made possible by the strength of our partnerships — across schools, health systems, governments, and communities — and by the unwavering dedication of our staff, Board of Directors, donors, and volunteers, whose belief in the potential of every child continues to fuel our mission.

As you read this year's report, we hope you recognize not only the meaningful progress CDI has achieved, but also the strong foundation we have built to meet the complex and evolving challenges facing our sector. We are proud to lead this critical work and remain deeply committed to advancing bold solutions in partnership with the communities we serve. Together, we are building innovative, equitable, and compassionate pathways to brighter futures for every child, youth, and family.

Brighter futures for our CLIENTS

The journey to a brighter future isn't one-size-fits-all. By delivering innovative, inclusive, and culturally responsive services, CDI is measurably improving outcomes for children, youth and families.

The Return of Taste of Home

For the first time since the COVID-19 pandemic, the **Taste of Home** program returned for in-person sessions, welcoming **30** children and youth (ages 6-17). Taste of Home is a drop-in cooking program for children and youth who have experienced interpersonal violence and are living in CDI's partner shelters — blending healthy meals with mindfulness and connection.

With donated kitchen equipment, we hosted a five-week Family-Style group, where families cooked healthy meals together and shared cultural recipes. A second seven-week group, in partnership with **Robertson House**, engaged children in leadership opportunities and skill development, while building community with each other and safe adults.

When Karen, a local business owner at Hummingbird Investment Holdings Inc., was looking for a way to give back, she found alignment with CDI's mission — committing not only to donating, but to volunteering her time through the Taste of Home program.

"It's such a wholesome environment where families come together, cook, learn, and share a meal," she shared. "You'd be surprised how excited kids get about making salad! Those little moments became opportunities for real connection."

Inspired by the program, Karen explored other ways to get involved and began volunteering with **Here to Help**, CDI's group intervention program for children and their mothers who have experienced family violence.

Reflecting on her experiences, Karen shared, "What struck me the most is how something as 'simple' as cooking can create genuine, authentic connections — especially for kids who have experienced so much. Giving these children these kinds of skills, tools, and safe experiences sets them up for long-term success."

New Pilot Program: Connecting Towhee

Following more than 50 years of transformative success at Camp Towhee, CDI launched Connecting Towhee, a pilot program that aims to help clients who attended camp stay connected to support services and form friendships during the school year, while continuing to build the confidence needed to improve their mental health and enrich their lives.

Children and youth participated in activities geared to enhance social skills, emotional regulation, and peer connection.

Following this successful pilot, CDI looks forward to exploring future opportunities to support Camp Towhee participants year-round.

Youth Engagement Steering Committee

CDI launched the **Youth Engagement Steering Committee (YESC)** to
provide youth across our programs with
a platform to collaborate, share their
voices, and drive positive change.

The committee offers opportunities to build meaningful connections, learn skills, and address issues youth are passionate about.

By sharing youth voices with CDI leadership, YESC ensures that programming is shaped by their lived experiences, needs, and the diverse communities we serve.

"The discussions that we have encourage us to be leaders in the community and deepen how we can help others. There should be more programming for youth because it shapes us to be better and gives us more opportunities to grow — there are a lot of things that we can help with."

Gender-Based Violence Services

In 2024-25, CDI's **Gender-Based Violence Services** experienced a **114%** increase in the number of children, youth and families supported, compared to the previous year.

More than **250** individuals accessed support through CDI's Mothers in Mind® (MIM), Here to Help, and Shelter and Community-Based Services, with **100%** of MIM and Here to Help participants expressing satisfaction with the programs.

Thanks to funding from the National Action Plan to End Gender-Based Violence, CDI launched a series of program videos to raise awareness about these critical services. These videos have been instrumental in helping ensure that more mothers and service providers are aware of the critical supports available in their communities, and how to access them.

Start Right Social Skills

Offered in partnership with the Toronto
District School Board and Toronto
Catholic District School Board, CDI
provided early intervention support to
more than 540 children and more than
20 schools through the Start Right
Social Skills (SRSS) program.

Among these families was Jamie*, who credits CDI with supporting their daughter's early growth with care and quidance.

"My daughter loved her SRSS summer program — she had so much fun learning, exploring, and starting to make new friends. The joy and confidence she gained from this experience are priceless, and we owe it all to the wonderful environment you've created."

Through structured "play and learn" sessions, this 10-week program supports kindergarten children who are having difficulty adjusting to the demands of their regular classroom by fostering social, emotional, and behavioural growth.

"Your expertise, patience, and genuine kindness have made such a positive impact on our lives. You have not only provided invaluable advice on how to support my daughter's growth but have also become a cherished part of our journey."

Supporting Inclusion at Early Learning Centres

After six years at CDI's **Fraser Mustard Early Learning Centre (ELC)**, one family is preparing for a heartfelt goodbye as their youngest son graduates to Junior Kindergarten.

"In many ways, his journey is just beginning," his caregiver shared. "In other ways, he has already gained many of the things he will need throughout life: a drive to move and grow, a sense of belonging and love, and a deep trust in the world around him."

Their son, who is preverbal and lives with developmental complexities, has made meaningful progress in communication and social connection throughout his time with CDI.

"My husband and I discussed what we believe to be true: our son is happy and developing well (at his own pace) because of the people and opportunities that surround him — and this, of course, is heavily influenced by his time at Fraser Mustard ELC."

In a world where children with disabilities and their families are too often excluded, this family's experience at CDI offered something different: inclusion, understanding, and personalized care.

We recognize the difficulty and extra cost in accommodating children with medical or developmental complexity. "But when it is possible, it should be done — because the benefits for these

children and their whole family are enormous."

With deep appreciation, the family offered a final message to the CDI team: "Knowing that your disabled child is accepted and thriving somewhere brings value and meaning back to families. So — a BIG thank you for your willingness to support my son and our family through all our requests, appointments, equipment, and logistics. An even bigger thank you for being present for him and his needs."

At CDI, we are proud to ensure that all children and families feel seen and supported, and our teams continue to look for opportunities to provide inclusive, equitable, and accessible care for all those we serve.

"His good quality of life gives [our community] a chance to see him in a more positive, ablebodied light. More importantly, it makes them less afraid of and more aware of disability. Perhaps some of them will develop more inclusive beliefs and actions as a result. Inclusion has wings."

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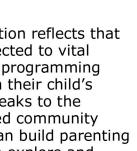
Parkdale-High Park EarlyON Child and Family Centre

In 2024-25, CDI's Parkdale-High Park **EarlyON Child and Family Centre** supported 9% more children and caregivers compared to the previous

This growth in participation reflects that more families are connected to vital resources and inclusive programming during a critical stage in their child's development. It also speaks to the Centre's role as a trusted community hub where caregivers can build parenting confidence, children can explore and learn through play, and families from diverse backgrounds can find belonging and support.

Brighter futures for our SOCIETY

Systemic change is essential to create lasting impact. By leveraging evidence and strategic partnerships, CDI is shaping stronger, more equitable systems — creating broader pathways to brighter futures for children, youth, families, and communities in Ontario, and across Canada.

First Steps to Success Toronto

CDI participated in a local adaptation of the evidence-based **Pyramid Model for Supporting Social Emotional Competence in Infants and Young Children**. This model builds the capacity of Early Childhood Educators (ECEs) and other staff/leaders to foster social and emotional skills in infants and toddlers, helping to reduce the risk of mental health challenges later in life.

This pilot project by the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH), funded in collaboration with Every Child Belongs (ECB), concluded in late 2024 with notable outcomes, including:

- Improved staff sensitivity to children's emotional needs (e.g., increased motivation and confidence, strategies to support)
- Improved emotional well-being in infants and toddlers (e.g., regulation

of nervous systems, calmer behaviours, smoothing transitions)

Increased levels of support and supervision from leadership

CDI Child Care Consultants played key roles in supporting this important initiative, including providing expertise as a First Step Coach and an Assessment Tool (TPITOs) Administrator.

SNAP 2.0: Expanding our Impact

CDI continued to advance the successful national expansion of the **Stop Now**And Plan® (SNAP) program to address the increasing mental health needs of children, youth, and families across Canada.

Under the SNAP 2.0 strategy, CDI is enhancing the reach and impact of our SNAP programs, including SNAP for Schools, SNAP Clinical, and SNAP Youth Justice, while ensuring cultural responsiveness within the communities we serve.

In 2024-25, all programs have made significant strides towards the strategy's 5-year targets:

- SNAP Clinical (Affiliate): Reached 86% of its 5-year target for new affiliate sites and 78% of the 5-year target for children served.
- SNAP Universal: Reached 68% of its 5-year target for new SNAP for Schools affiliate sites, and 75% of the 5-year target for children served.
- SNAP Youth Justice: Reached 61% of its 5-year site target, and 49% of the 5-year target for youth served.

Overall, the SNAP Scaling and Impact initiative licensed 9 new affiliate sites in 2024-25, bringing high-quality, evidence-based support to even more communities.

Measurement-Based Care Implementation

In partnership with Capitalize for Kids, CDI continued to successfully implement Measurement-Based Care (MBC) at a client-level. By routinely collecting assessment data, MBC allows CDI's clinicians to better respond to client needs and make informed, shared treatment decisions with families.

MBC was newly implemented for youth ages 12-17 years old with a diagnosed learning disability, co-occurring mental health difficulties, and receiving individual talk therapy.

Early results suggest that some youth with social anxiety and communication challenges are engaging more comfortably in therapy by sharing updates through these brief, regular questionnaires.

New Pilot Program for Early Childhood **Professionals: In Development**

CDI began working in collaboration with a post-secondary institution to develop an exciting new pilot program to address training and resource gaps among early childhood professionals.

The program will aim to equip Early Childhood Educators (ECEs) and Assistants (ECAs) with tools and techniques to support children under six years old in developing emotionregulation, social skills, and positive behaviours.

LDMH Workshops

Nearly **200** participants joined CDI's LDMH Workshops designed for caregivers of children with learning disabilities, as well as educators, counsellors, service providers, and other interested community members.

Covering a range of topics, the workshops offered:

- Current insights from the field
- Practical strategies
- Parenting support
- A deeper understanding of the intersection between learning disabilities and mental health

Through a culture of inclusion and continued learning, CDI is building a thriving organization where people feel valued and empowered to lead change.

IDEA Action Plan

CDI partnered with **D&D Inclusion Consulting** to conduct a comprehensive IDEA (Inclusion, Equity, Diversity and Accessibility) assessment as part of our ongoing commitment to fostering a more inclusive and equitable organization.

The assessment included a review of key human resource and organizational policies/procedures, an IDEA staff survey, and consultations with CDI's Board of Directors, staff, and IDEA Advisory Committee. These activities gathered insights across key areas, including: governance and leadership, human resources and organizational culture, and client service delivery.

The resulting **IDEA Assessment and Action Plan**, launched in the fall of 2024, outlines strengths of the organization, areas for growth, and includes an action plan with accountability structures and a timeline to guide CDI's IDEA efforts over the next five years, and beyond.

Continuous Improvement Committee

CDI launched a new **Continuous Improvement Committee** to empower staff to propose ideas that enhance systems and processes across the organization. This initiative encourages innovations that create better client outcomes, higher-quality services, a more engaging staff experience, and stronger partnerships with our stakeholders.

Proposals are reviewed by the interdepartmental committee and considered for implementation based on alignment with CDI's policies, collective agreements, and strategic priorities.

By centering staff voices, CDI is reinforcing our commitment to a collaborative and responsive work environment where everyone has an opportunity to shape our collective future.

Accreditation

CDI successfully completed our accreditation cycle with the **Canada Centre for Accreditation**, achieving **100%** in both Mandatory and Leading Practice Standards.

This outstanding achievement reflects the dedication, expertise, and hard work of our team.

This process reaffirms that CDI continues to deliver transformative, high-quality services to children, youth and families across our communities.

Professional Development: Early Years and Child Care Services

Throughout the year, CDI's **EarlyON** and **Early Learning Centre** staff participated in a wide range of professional development opportunities designed to enhance inclusive, high-quality early years programming.

This included interactive trainings to deepen understanding and application of Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, and Accessibility (IDEA), and Truth and Reconciliation principles — supporting staff in embedding inclusive practices into play-based learning and daily interactions with children and families.

Through ongoing learning and development opportunities, CDI is committed to reducing the gap in outcomes for equity deserving communities, and upholding a safe, inclusive environment where everyone belongs.

Infrastructure Changes for Accessibility

As part of CDI's ongoing commitment to creating accessible, barrier-free spaces for children, youth, families, staff and community members, we are grateful to have secured funding from the Ontario Ministry of Health and the Ontario Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services to support infrastructure improvements at our St. Clair Gardens location.

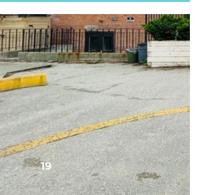
This important initiative includes the renovation of the reception area (Phase 1 — complete), as well as the installation of a wheelchair lift to ensure accessibility throughout the building (Phase 2).

Launched in 2024, this initiative is progressing on schedule and is expected to be completed by fall 2025.

We look forward to continuing to advance this and future infrastructure initiatives to promote equity, dignity and accessibility for all.

CDI welcomed our SNAP affiliate network, program supporters, and community partners to our 2024 SNAP **Symposium: The Power of Early** Intervention

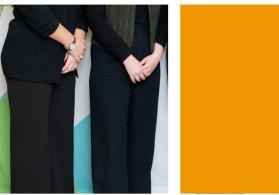
Over the course of two days, CDI's SNAP team shared innovative research updates, and we heard insights around the evolving mental health needs of our communities from various sector partners and leaders.

Throughout the month of December, more than **400** children, youth and caregivers received household necessities and diverse holiday gifts.

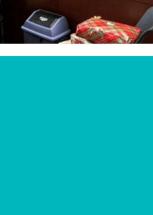
